Coyote Trap Check Proposal Summary

In the December Wildlife Board meeting, the Division was directed to take a proposal from the central RAC through the public process. The proposal is "To change the trap check rule from 48 hours to 7 days for coyotes"

The Division is not supporting this proposal for the following reasons:

- 1. Coyotes are not protected wildlife meaning that the Division and Wildlife Board do not have the authority to make regulations specific to coyotes.
- 2. Therefore, any changes to the trap check rule would apply to all species that may be caught in a coyote set such as bobcat and kit fox.

WHY?

Traps are not species specific, in other words it is impossible to set a trap that is guaranteed to only catch a coyote. Traps that are intended for coyotes sometimes trap protected wildlife species and are therefore subject to the trap check regulations.

- 3. There are 4 main reasons why the Division opposes changes to the current trap checking regulations:
 - a. The Division considers the possibility of leaving an animal in trap alive for 7 days unethical
 - b. A 7 day trap check will result in protected wildlife being wasted.
 - c. A 7 day trap check could remove the ability of trappers to release non-target species unharmed
 - d. A 7 day trap check could result in increased take of bobcats and kit fox (a state sensitive species), gray fox and others.

Recent Changes to Accommodate Trappers include:

- 1. Trap check period was changed to 96 hours for lethal sets
- 2. A person can check another person's traps "buddy trapping"

The Division supports efforts to increase funding for targeted removal of coyotes by Wildlife Services and increased sportsmen participation through hunting.
