Utah Wild Sheep Foundation has reviewed, on a unit by unit basis, the DWR recommendations for Bighorn Sheep ("BHS") permits for the 2020 season. As an organization, we are excited about the overall increase in permit numbers and believe it reflects the hard work and commitment made to BHS recovery by the DWR and related sportsmen/conservation groups. We also understand and support the need to reduce permit numbers on certain units, as necessary, in order to maintain age objectives, overall population health and quality hunting experiences for these much sought after hunting permits.

We would like to express our concern in regards to several units in the state that we consider "recovering" populations. These populations of both Desert and California Bighorn have all suffered catastrophic disease events, which resulted in substantial declines in overall population and resultant permit numbers. The limited hunting opportunities that remain have been very difficult, at best, with substantial financial and time commitments required, in very difficult terrain, to have a reasonable opportunity for harvest. As these populations recover, we feel it is appropriate to have a more conservative approach in respect to increased permit numbers, in order to ensure continued population recovery and quality hunting opportunities.

San Juan subunits-last year there were 3 permits issued with 1 successfully filled. There are 5 permits being recommended for 2020.
Dirty Devil-last year there were 2 permits issued and there are 6 permits being recommended for 2020. Although both hunters were successful in 2019, they hunted with extremely knowledgeable guides and spent considerable time afield. There has also been a consistent decrease in the age class of rams harvested on this unit, over the past 4 years.
Stansbury Mtns-last year there were 3 permits issued and there are 5

• Stansbury Mths-last year there were 3 permits issued and there are 5 permits being recommended for 2020. This unit is well under population objective and has been supplemented by transplant for the last 3 years.

Additionally, as one of the organizations that participated in updating the Statewide BHS management plan in 2018, we believe the permit recommendations were set as more of a guideline rather than hard numbers and want to reiterate our support for giving the DWR flexibility in determining appropriate permit numbers.

In conclusion, we would like to thank the DWR and its personnel for their continued commitment to BHS management and recovery throughout the State of Utah.

I have encountered bison on many occasions and I have a firm understanding of where and when they congregate. I've watched their numbers grow to concerning levels and I echo the concerns outlined in the presentation. I support the proposal, however I believe that when these permits become available an emphasis will need to be placed on hunters using extreme caution when utilizing river access. My concern is that the permits will attract hunters who have no knowledge of the dangers in Desolation Canyon. Additionally, the bison come into Three Canyon in late fall/early winter which is when the ice dam dangers are highest. Having experience with the ice dams in that area I am aware of the extreme dangers. Under ideal conditions Desolation Canyon presents many hazards to unknowing boaters and the hazards are compounded in late fall by cold weather.

As a hunter of the Bookcliffs and an outfitter who lives in Green River Utah I have years of experience and observations there., I spend all year and especially each fall on the unit and have done so for the past 30 years, I strongly disagree with the spike hunt. The reduction of mature bulls is alarming. The elk herd is not at objective and allowing some more mature bulls to be on the units does not compromise the forage available. We are harvesting more spike elk than can be sustained to keep a healthy mature bull herd. The reduction each year of mature bull hunting to allow for spike elk hunting is not an opportunity improvement for a hunter who chooses to hunt a mature bull on a unit such as the roadless Bookcliffs who many dream of the backcountry hunt. Spike elk hunts should be on units at herd objective and not on units that are under overall population objectives. The Bookcliffs is the area Utah is struggling to manage a healthy elk herd and continuing the spike hunt is compromising the unit. The argument that the spike hunt is an opportunity for families to get together to hunt is not what I see on the spike elk hunt. It is much more made up of adults males and not wives and kids, especially the roadless portion.

As a practicing wildlife biologist, I strongly support this bison management proposal for a number of reasons. First, it represents "outside the box" reasoning and a creative management response to a pervasive problem that is also well-matched to the multiple management constraints in the area. Second, it also provides a truly unique hunt opportunity for an iconic western species that many hunters may never otherwise have the opportunity to experience.

Third, this is potentially a significant revenue-generator for the DWR, particularly the non-resident tag sales. This hunt is akin to Montana's over-the-counter sheep hunt--a highly sought, iconic species hunt opportunity via OTC tag sales--there's nothing like it for bison anywhere. Period. This will attract a lot of interest and tag sales, but the difficult access and rough terrain, coupled with the narrow window of opportunity in the late fall will self-limit success rates, which is precisely why there is no need for a drawing or limitation of tags in this case. I'm sure there will be plenty of locals calling for "resident-only" opportunity, but this would be a terribly short-sighted approach and would limit both revenues and success rates significantly.

I would strongly caution against opening this season prior to October 1, mainly because meat spoilage is a distinct possibility given the remote, difficult access and the sheer size of these animals. By default, the vast majority of sportsmen have absolutely no concept of how large these animals are, and only those who are well-prepared with pack animals (or who get extremely lucky with a kill near an access point) have any hope of successfully salvaging all of the meat and getting back to the trailhead even with favorably cool weather. The heat encountered in this area through September makes an early season start impractical. I oppose this for a lifetime recommendations? several reasons. First, Utah does not limit muzzleloaders to traditional weapons that have inherent limitations. Let's be honest: new in-line technology, the use of scopes, black powder substitutes, and a wide range of sabots and conical bullets make modern muzzleloaders quite comparable to modern smokeless powder rifle cartridges. What you are proposing here is akin to Colorado's 4th rifle season--a chance to hunt the oldest, best bucks in the unit during their most vulnerable time during the year with a highly-accurate, long-range weapon. Like Colorado, you will see a very high success rate on older-age class bucks if you implement this strategy, which will be great for a handful of hunters for a couple of years, and then the units will suffer a loss of quality. This has been done elsewhere and the evidence is clear--it's not sustainable. Don't do it. Second, it sets a terrible precedent that is very difficult to reverse. For example, in Colorado units offering these late-season tags, the demand

and outcry to keep these seasons is overwhelming, even after the quality disappears, the age-class has been dramatically reduced and the herds are not performing to management expectations. I strongly caution you NOT to attempt re-inventing the wheel in this case. Learn from the failures of neighboring states and don't repeat their mistakes.
